



## HIPPY Group Meetings

- Group meetings offer educational enrichment, information and activities that meet the needs of the parents.
- Enrichment activities are provided for children during group meetings.
- Can include a field experience (surrounding a developmental domain)

A meeting of the Edgefield County First Steps Partnership Board was held on August 11, 2025, at the Edgefield County Chamber of Commerce. Gail Jackson, Board Chair, called the meeting to order at 6:07 p.m.

Candi had sent the minutes from the April 14, 2025, meeting to the members prior to the meeting. There was a motion from Emanuel, with a second from Renee, to approve the minutes. The motion was approved.

Gail asked Candi to go over the Executive Director's report for July (see attached). Candi expanded on a few of the items. Most of July was spent closing out FY 25 and getting FY 26 programs up and running.

Gail then called everyone's attention to the FY25 Performance Report (see attached). Candi highlighted a few areas and said that we did very well. The only program that did not meet 100% of the projected to serve was Nurse Family Partnership (75%), and we terminated that program effective February 2025. There were no additional questions or comments.

The next item on the agenda was the FY25 Final Budget Expenditure report. There are still unresolved issues in our finance system and Candi stated she does not have a good estimate of what our final carryover numbers will be. This should be available by the end of the month.

Gail called the Board's attention to the letters that had been submitted regarding dual employment for Candi (she does training for other county partnerships and might assist in Saluda with their Triple P Parenting program), Deb Padgett (she is the Triple P Parenting Instructor for both Edgefield and Saluda County First Steps), and Kim Chariker (the Executive Director of Saluda County First Steps) who will be assisting with child care training for our county. After consideration by the Board, it was decided that this outside work does not affect the efficiency of the work performed for Edgefield County First Steps for any of the employees. After a motion from Renee and a second from Emanuel, the requests for dual employment were approved.

The next item on the agenda was the allocation of extra carryover funds, which includes both state funds and private (cash) funds. The carryover still needs to be finalized by our Regional Finance Manager (RFM) and the State Office finance department. Candi gave the Board members a handout with requests for allocations of the carryover funds (see attached). While our official carryover for state funds is still not determined, Candi explained that she did know that there was \$5,445 in state funds to be allocated due the state board not allowing the total amount of the raise that was recommended by this Board for Candi (\$1,891) and the new policy disallowing state funds to be used for advertising and promotional materials (\$3,554). Candi stated there was \$29,629 in private funds for carryover (with \$17,050 already allocated). This leaves \$12,579 in private funds to be allocated. In addition to the state and cash amount, there were recommendations for allocations of \$2,788 from our NASCAR fundraiser to community outreach and \$1,320 (from the state office fundraiser) to books and advertising and promotions for our community outreach. There was a motion from Renee and a second from Gail to approve the allocation requests. The motion was approved.

Next on the agenda was discussion about Edgefield First Steps joining with the Greenwood and Saluda First Steps offices to apply for a grant to pilot the Home Instruction for Parents of Preschool Youngsters (HIPPY) program (see handout). This would be a grant for 1 year and would serve a total of 50 new families. Greenwood would be the lead county and would employ 2 full time home visitors and 1 program supervisor – they would be responsible for serving 30 families. Edgefield and Saluda would employ 1 part time home visitor each who would serve 10 families in their respective counties. All costs associated with this program would be covered with this grant. After much discussion, there was a motion from Gail with a second from Averie to move forward with this application with Greenwood and Saluda.

At this time, Candi informed the Board about the new Local Partnership Fiscal and Operational Guidelines that we were given on July 24<sup>th</sup>. These guidelines were not given to us for any type of review before they were released and are very restrictive with regard to professional development opportunities, community outreach expenses, credit card usage, and purchasing. No training has been offered and emails with questions have gone mostly unanswered. In their attempt to refine policies that would strengthen accountability, they have become overreactive in response to the issues that occurred in another county. As these guidelines stand now, we will have to spend much more money for items such as office supplies, child care training materials, and food for child care trainings due to new purchasing policies. Candi is working with a group of Executive Directors to comprise a list of issues/problems with some of the items in these new guidelines, along with a list of proposed compromises/solutions. There was discussion among Board members with a request that Candi keep the Board informed about these guidelines.

In other business, Candi said she planned to continue with a team sponsorship for the Edgefield Recreation League. We had already discussed the NASCAR and Night to Celebrate funds. Lastly, Candi gave the Board the FY 26 meeting schedule (see attached).

There was no other business, so after a motion by Emanuel and a second from Renee, the meeting adjourned at 7:45 p.m.
